What you need to know about



I would like to take this time and talk to you about the upcoming changes in VA benefits relating to "The PACT Act". This new law enhances benefits related to toxic exposures for our Vietnam and Gulf War Veterans.

The Department Service Officers are encouraging all veterans to file a new or supplemental claim based on this new law. We also encourage all veterans to apply for VA health care. Eligible dependents and survivors of deceased veterans may also benefit from this new law. Contact a

Department Service Officer with all your questions. A full listing of our service officers is on page 6.

The Pact Act adds hypertension and monoclonal gammopathy of Underdetermined Significance to the list of presumptives for Agent Orange exposure. Establishes presumptions of service connection for additional respiratory illnesses and cancers related to burn pits or airborne hazards exposure for Gulf War and Global War on Terrorism veterans. Expands the presumption of Agent Orange exposure to veterans who served in Thailand, Laos, Cambodia, and other locations. Also expands and extends eligibility for health care for many veterans.

Now, we have all seen the commercials on TV relating to veterans that were stationed at Camp Lejeune and were exposed to the toxic water. Be leery of these, do your homework. You have until August 2024

to file a claim with these lawyers. But, keep in mind that if you do file a "Tort Claim" with these attorneys it could possibly affect your VA, Medicare and Medicaid benefits. This is a claim against the federal government See below extract from the new law.



From "Honoring Our PACT Act," Section 804:

Any award made to an individual, or legal representative of an individual, under this section shall be offset by the amount of any disability award, payment, or benefit provided to the individual, or legal representative--

 Secretary of Veterans Affairs;
(ii) the Medicare
program under title XVIII of the
Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.
1395 et seq.);
or

(iii) the Medicaid program under title XIX of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 1396 et seq.);

(B) in connection with health care or a disability relating to exposure to the water at Camp Lejeune.

First Membership Goal Achieved!

Thanks to all the hard work of your District Leadership and Post Membership Teams, we have exceeded the Sept 14 50% tSarget for 2023! We ended up at 51.88% of Goal, with an impressive 232 of our 373 Posts (62.2%) at or above the 50% mark.

Playing no small part in this impressive performance is the increase of MyLegion Membership processing at the Post Level. Compared to the same time period last year, Jul 1 – Sept 12, we've seen a 41% increase of MyLegion Post Membership Processing, for a total of 165 Posts. 44% of our 373 Posts are now using MyLegion! Keep up the GREAT work!

I've attached National's 2023 Target Dates for your reference. As you can see, the Veterans Day and Pearl Harbor Day targets are increases of 10% over the preceding Target Dates. We'll need to ensure we've got our Membership Game Face on, especially during those time periods.

Can an S.A.L. member sign up a new Legion member?

Yes! The same applies to Auxiliary membership. As long as the necessary membership application is filled out and the prospective member provides a copy of his/her DD-214 discharge papers (this applies to Legion membership...prospective S.A.L. and Auxiliary members need to supply a copy of discharge papers for the relative through whom their eligibility is established) and they pay the appropriate amount for dues, simply submit these materials to the Legion or S.A.L. Adjutant. In fact...many members of the Sons like to carry around blank copies of membership applications for each of the Legion Family organizations, just in case.



Homeless Veterans

I met with a Veteran and leader in the Michigan Veteran Community for dinner a few months ago. At one point in our conversation, he asked me if the VA's programs for Homeless Veterans were working. While I didn't have exact figures in my head, I assured him that their Ending Veteran Homeless initiative began in 2010. The implementation of various programs designed to help veterans avoid or end homelessness utilizing the Housing First model, has had measured success. According to data from the VA's 2021 Annual Report, since its inception twelve years ago, over 920,000 veterans and their families are no longer homeless. This means the homeless veteran population has gone from 26% of the total homeless population in 2009 to a low of 13% in 2021.

What do you say is Housing First? Housing First is a housing assistance policy that offers unconditional permanent housing, as quickly as possible, to homeless people with other supportive services provided after. Housing First is based on five main principles:

five main principles:

- Immediate access to permanent housing with no housing readiness requirements
- Veteran choice and self-determination
- Individualized and client-driven supports
 - Social and Community Integration

Recovery orientation

While we may be inclined to put pre-conditions on services, the reality is that it is nearly impossible to sustain employment, education, physical and mental health, food stability, recovery/sobriety, and family cohesion if you don't have a permanent roof over your head. The reduction of 50% of veterans experiencing homelessness since 2010 demonstrates this truth.

While the VA provides directive funding and assistance to end homelessness, each county in Michigan implements its own homeless prevention program. Connecting with local leaders in your municipality by partnering with the VA, and advocating for Housing First, along with increased funding and implementation, is an important way to utilize our collective voice. Assisting a veteran to obtain transportation, technology, food, basic household items, proper ID,

and most importantly, helping them negotiate the system can make all the difference.

I would be remiss if I didn't address one issue. Since I have been working with homeless veterans, I repeatedly hear the same statement, "Some veterans want to be homeless!" In my experience, this is blatantly false. Veterans (and all people) don't want to be homeless. They may not be able to imagine how they can sustain or pay for housing. They may not want to negotiate the housing market. They may not want to obtain goals someone else chooses for them. They may not want to live in group housing, a tiny house, in the city, or out in the boonies. What they do want is autonomy, respect, support, and a place to call home.

Finally, PLEASE, if a veteran experiencing homelessness contacts you or your Legion family for help, connect them to VA services by contacting either the National call center for Homeless Veterans at 1-877-4AID VET (877-424-3838) or va.gov/homeless. Have No Fear ALA MIS is Here!

What does the anacronym ALA MIS mean? In formal terms, it means American Legion Auxiliary Management Information System. To myself and my Unit, it means fast, quick, and seamless payments for new members and renewals. It is also the system that allows our membership chairperson to help update names and addresses and change contact information on members.

Dale H. Wheeler, ALA Unit 219, of Fife Lake, Michigan, was part of the National Bata testers when National wanted to test, giving units access to their member's information. Now almost 15+ years later, we are again a Bata unit, this time for processing payments directly to national. Our ALA MIS access has been a wonderful tool, allowing us to process address, name, phone, or email changes. Besides making changes, you can quickly see which members are still not renewed by pulling an Unpaid Unit Members report. If you are wondering if a status change was completed? You can check if it has happened yet. ALA MIS allows you to quickly get a list and use it to make labels to mail to members also. The list of useful things goes on.

Now we are Bata testing direct payment processing, no longer having to mail a check and transmittal notice to the department. How is that going? Great! Have you ever mailed a transmittal and, after a few weeks, found an envelope from the department with the transmittal returned to you? Something was wrong; it did not balance, someone's dues were already paid, or any number of issues. So those 40 members that you tried to pay did not get processed. Fix the issue and mail it back for processing. That takes time. Not to mention if you also must get another check to add to it—no more of that. You go through the list of members and select the box for the year you are paying, as simple as that. Review your list, and make sure you have marked everyone on your list to pay. Check what the system says is the total charge. Note that for your checkbook, then put in the bank card number to process the payment—self-service at its best.

We had a total of 87 paid reservations, 68 students registered, and approximately 58 students participated enough to receive their certificate. Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation

The Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation program promotes our mission to enhance the lives of

U.S. veterans, military, and their families.

You may be thinking, "How do I do that?" A good starting point would be by reading the Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation: A Guide for Volunteers. Within this guide, you will learn how to; engage in thoughtful conversation, listen without judgment, and the importance of confidentiality, attire, and professional behavior. Attending the webinar for VA&R is strongly suggested, { alaforveterans.org}.

What can you do? Assist in activities that help homeless veterans. A few examples; Raise funds for local American Legion posts to help veterans and their families through the Family Support Network for veterans at risk of losing their housing or homeless veterans transitioning to permanent housing. Make payments of overdue rent, utility payments or deposits, and security deposits. Contact homeless veteran emergency shelters, transitional housing projects, and permanent housing projects in your community and identify the organization's volunteer and in-kind contribution needs.

Help the American Legion, State Department of Veterans Affairs, and the Chamber of Commerce promote job fairs for veterans and their families. Volunteer for Habitat for Humanity, specifically if the house being built is supported by the American Legion.

Educate units and community partners about volunteer opportunities available at VA medical centers, state veterans' homes, Fisher Houses, and other VA healthcare locations. Sponsor informational programs and recruitment tables at post and unit functions and at community events. Utilize department websites, newsletters, and other media.

There is not a VA hospital close to your community? Service to veterans recognizes volunteers who provide services to veterans and their families outside a VAMC. Volunteers conduct projects and work for military, veterans, and/or families from their homes and communities. A few examples; organize transportation for veterans to assist them with essential errands or medical appointments. Contact the Legion Service Officer at your post and offer to be on the list of people to contact when a military family needs help. Please remember to keep track of your hours and money spent. This will be helpful when it is time to do unit reports.






take place after the mid-term elections.

The Senate and House are now back in session to address some pressing issues. As many of you know, any bill that does not pass in this Legislative Session that ends in December will automatically die. So, both House and the Senate are working on getting some bills passed before then. This includes the "Lame Duck" session that will

One issue that we have been told will come up before the end of the year is the Property Tax exemption given to Veterans who are 100% disabled and unemployable from service-connected injury(s). This issue was vetoed by the Governor's office because it was bundled with another bill she did not like. She has also expressed some concern as to the cost to State Government for this bill. As it is now funded in full by the Local units of Government, that as we have been advised is a violation of the State Constitution Article 19 subsection 29 and the Headlee Amendment. This is somewhat in dispute by some in State Government. I should add that some of the bills that were sponsored on this issue we did not support, including one that would let local units of Government decide on their own if they even wished to grant any such exemption. That bill is dead, and we will work hard to make sure it stays that way.

During this State Legislative Session, we were following 45 bills that had to do with Veteran issues, one issue the property tax exemption given to 100% totally disabled Veterans had 8 bills alone. We also dealt with the PACT ACT and other Federal issues, the VFW has taken the lead on is these issues and we worked as back up on some of the Federal Veteran issues.

The new State budget includes funding for a study to determine where New State Veteran Cemeteries should be placed. Crawford County is already ahead of the program in trying to get a New State Cemetery next to the National Guard Base in Grayling. As of this writing, all the details have not been worked out regarding the locations yet.

The 2023 State budget includes funding for a New Veterans Home in Marquette, Michigan, to replace the home at that site. We will still push for the full seven new Veteran Homes we promised a few years ago. Many Senators and Representatives have been very supportive of our efforts.

The 2023 State budget includes the request for funding for the Michigan Veterans Coalition to keep the service officer program run by MI DAV, VFW, Vietnam Veterans of American, and The American Legion. We will be working on Roll-

over funding for this program starting with the new Legislative session in 2023. This will enable the program to become a permanent part of the yearly budget process.

The VFW and the American Legion will still be pushing for Hyperbaric Oxidation Treatment for Veterans with PTSD and TBI. We should find out this month (September or early October) if a grant has been awarded to Oxford Treatment Center for a pilot program.

New bills are still being introduced as of this writing. One such bill would let the spouse of a Veteran who dies and has a Veteran License Plate at the time of death; the spouse could continue to display the License Plate on a Vehicle they own in their name. We discussed this issue at our Fall Conference in Muskegon and opted to not support this bill.

We will also be working with other Veteran Organizations to get more support for Veteran bills. This has proven to be very effective in the last few years.

Beyond keeping track of new bills that are introduced, some of our priorities are but are not limited to:

- 1. Suicide Prevention Programs for Veterans.
- 2. Roll over funding for the Service Officer Program run by The American Legion, Michigan Disabled Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Vietnam Veterans of America.
- 3. Continue to support the Property Tax Exemption given to 100% disabled Veterans from Service-connected injuries.
 - 4. Funding for more Veteran homes.
- 5. Cemetery in the U. P. (Note should be made that this issue has been ongoing for at least 10 years. I have been advised that one of the problems is that when the Legislators get close to having a bill in the past, many Veterans and Vet-

eran Service Groups push to have it placed in a location they think it should be. Because the State budget includes funding to do a study as to where Cemeteries should go, we have agreed to let that be the determining factor and not push for a different location. We would hope that our Veterans from the U. P. would also honor this and not contact their Senators and Representatives about the placement of a cemetery.

- 6. Work with the Federal Government to change the law to include all Veterans getting V .A. Hospice Care at home after being in a V. A. Hospital or Veteran Home to get the larger burial payment.
- 7. Extend the eligibility of the State Vietnam bonus to include Veterans who did not get it when it was issued but served btw 2-24-1973 and 5-7-1975 when the war was officially over.
- 8. Work with other Veteran Groups and Legislators to determine how the MVAA could be best organized to work with Service Organizations like the American Legion.
- 9. Make sure Veterans have at least 75% seats on the Board of the C.C.C.O.A. (formerly the American Legion Property at Higgins Lake)

The order listed above is random.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION: As many of you have seen on TV ads for Veterans and Civilians who were stationed at Camp Lejeune between 1953 and 1987 to contact an attorney as advertised. MAKE SURE THAT VETERANS DO NOT CONTACT A PRIVATE ATTORNEY. Veterans and their spouses should first contact a Service Officer. A private attorney will file the paperwork and then get a percentage of the award given to the filer. Service Officers charge nothing for this service and do not get any part of the award. Please make sure you pass this on to any Veteran or Veteran Groups. Civilians who worked on Base are the only ones who should talk with a Private Attorney.
