Legislative Report

It has been a busy Legislative session since the Michigan budget has been finalized. New Legislation for all Veteran non-profits passed in the Budget process introduced by Rep. Ron Robinson. The budget includes \$4 million to be distributed as grants to Veteran Posts that are in need of funds for much-needed repairs

and other necessary expenses. The final types of grants that will be awarded have not been finalized by the Michigan Veteran Affairs Agency, and the application process have yet to be decided. However, the legislation does say that a grant cannot be over \$300,000 to any one group or origination. I am alerting our Post now so you can look around and see what you would apply for when the grant program is officially announced in the upcoming months, as no timeline has been set yet for the announcement.

We have been busy at the Michigan House and Senate and also getting calls from U.S. Congress members (even though the Federal Government is shut down as of this writing). I hope the interest in Veteran issues continues and we get legislation that will help Veterans. Also, as a reminder, please continue to visit our Legislative Priorities list on the Department's Web page and click on the Priorities to send letters to your State and Federal Officials. You could be the winner of some cash at the 2026 Department Convention based on your involvement with the program.

Speaking of helping others, if you want to donate to one of our projects or programs, all options are listed on our website under programs/guides and then click "donate". The list will then be displayed. You will also find a list of worthy non-profits and/or programs that we do not accept donations for right below that information. That doesn't mean you can't make a donation to the non-profits listed or to any other project on that list, it just cannot be processed here at headquarters.

When you report members who have passed on our website at www.michalaux.org, please understand that a form must still be completed and sent to headquarters with all information required. You can mail it or use email, whatever works best for you. We then use the details on that form to make the necessary changes in Nationals ALAMIS database.

If you are using any forms, please remember to

check the website for the most up to date documents available. This will save time and money for your Unit and our Department. You can avoid lengthy delays and wasted postage which is a benefit for us and our Veterans. We will all have more time and money to further our mission.

As you know, each Unit should receive a membership packet in or around July. Those membership packets are made up of materials provided to us by National, the incoming program representatives and documents we have here at headquarters. Specifically, the Unit roster provided is generated by National in early April every year. Do not use that as your working roster, by the time you receive same, it is already outdated. Up to date membership information can be found on ALA-MIS.

I want to clear up some confusion or misunderstanding regarding ALAMIS. In order to have access to ALAMIS, you must first create (or already have) an account on Nationals website www.alaforveterans.org. The sign on information you use for the National website will then become your log in for ALAMIS. If you do not have an account on Nationals website (alaforveterans.org) and you request full access to ALAMIS, the representatives at National will assign one to you. By the way, full access requires training from National before you can utilize their database (ALAMIS).

Be well and keep each other safe. See you in February at our next gathering in Port Huron, Michigan. You

Kyle Ploehn, U.S. Air Force Veteran, Legionnaire, and Adaptive Sports Athlete Mark Sutton

Kyle Ploehn is a U.S. Air Force Veteran and member of the SSG Michael A. Dickinson II American Legion Post 257, Battle Creek. Kyle's disability stems from a hip disarticulation amputation, which involves the removal of his entire leg up to the hip due to complications related to his military service. This significant life change occurred in December 2019, following a series of health issues stemming from his time in the U.S. Air Force.

Despite the challenges posed by his disability, adaptive sports have played a crucial role in Kyle's life. One of the ways it has improved Kyle's life is rehabilitation and physical fitness. Engaging in adaptive sports has allowed Kyle to focus on his rehabilitation. Participation in these activities has helped him

maintain physical fitness, which is essential for his overall health and well-being. The structured nature of adaptive sports training can help regain strength and mobility.

His mental and emotional well-being has improved. Adaptive sports have provided Kyle with a sense of purpose and a way to cope with the emotional impacts of his Competing amputation. and training with fellow athletes who have faced similar challenges fosters a positive mindset and can alleviate feelings of isolation or depression that often accompany significant life

changes.

Through his involvement in adaptive sports, Kyle has built meaningful relationships with other athletes. Meeting Vietnam veterans and forming connections with members of the American Legion has created a supportive community where he feels understood and valued. This camaraderie is vital for social integration and emotional support.

Kyle is passionate about raising awareness of adaptive sports and their benefits. His experiences have fueled his commitment to advocating for greater recognition and resources for adaptive athletes, inspiring others in similar situations to engage in these sports and reclaim their lives after disabilities.

His participation has led to personal growth. Adaptive sports have encouraged Kyle to push beyond his limits, helping him develop resilience and a fighting spirit. The challenges he faces in these sports reflect the broader challenges of living with a disability, allowing him to grow both physically and mentally.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs played a crucial role in Kyle's journey to adaptive sports by providing comprehensive medical support following his leg amputation. They covered all his surgeries and prosthetics, which enabled him to recover and adapt to his new circumstances. Additionally, during his rehabilitation at the VA, Kyle met Vietnam veterans involved with the American Legion, fostering a sense of camaraderie that encouraged him to engage further with the veteran community and explore adaptive sports. This support not only facilitated his physical recovery but also helped him connect with others who share similar experiences, ultimately enhancing his involvement in adaptive sports.

Kyle competes in adaptive sports competitions, including the VA Golden Games, where he has competed against both individuals with disabilities and those without.

In summary, adaptive sports have played a crucial role in Kyle's journey following his amputation. They have not only enhanced his physical capabilities but also provided emotional support, fostered community ties, and instilled a sense of purpose, making significant contributions to his quality of life.

Congratulations to the Detachment of Michigan on leading the way in the 2024-2025 term with the largest donation in the central region of \$12,047.00. We are halfway there this year with \$6550.00; let's continue

on the upward curve and surpass last year's donations. We currently sit in second place behind our friends in Ohio!

This committee is given a list of grant applications to review after the national convention. And we must decide the ones that the SAL wants to recommend. This year, we had 50 to review out of 275 that were submitted to the foundation. We selected the following: Comfort Crew for Military Kids \$25,000, Mercy Medical Angels \$16,000, National Braille Press \$17,829, Young Marines Inc. \$50,000, ASXL Rare Research Endowment Foundation \$19,600, Our Military Kids \$50,356.

As most of you know, the Legion now receives two grants. This year, the grants totaled \$675,000 out of the \$850,000 that we had to distribute. All of our grant selections came to \$178,429, and that is before the foundation receives the choices of the Legion and the Auxiliary.

The selections this year were the hardest we have had in all the years I have been on this committee. I wish we could have given each a portion of what they had requested, so no one was left behind. DETACHMENT DISASTER FUND

In April 2025, we received a letter from National Internal Affairs Chairman Matthew Herndon regarding the Sons and the National Emergency Fund Trust and Grants. We sent it to the Department's Judge Advocate, Brett Holt. After minor wording changes, the revised resolution was passed at the DEC 3 in Battle Creek. The resolution will now cover our members and their families if there is a natural disaster within our state. Such as ice storms, floods, fire, tornadoes, etc. Resolved that the funding of the Disaster Relief Fund may be raised through donations, fundraisers, grants, and allocations as approved by the Detachment Executive Committee.

MISSING IN AMERICA PROJECT Greg Price

The Missing in America Project, also known as MIAP, was launched nationwide in early 2007 by Fred Salanti, a former Major in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War. The Missing in America Project is comprised of volunteers who visit funeral homes and mortuaries across the United States to help

locate, identify, and inter any unclaimed ashes, sometimes referred to as cremains, of veterans that have been sitting on shelves in storage rooms for years.

In May 2007, at a regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, the American Legion showed its support for the Missing in America Project with Resolution 24. This resolution allows Legionnaires to assist in locating and identifying cremated remains that have been left unclaimed in their local areas.

We Sons of the American Legion have also shown our sup-

port for Resolution 24 and have committed ourselves to visiting funeral homes in our communities to help find unclaimed remains and obtain any necessary documentation to secure a final resting place for these Forgotten Heroes.

Not all unclaimed cremains are Veterans. That is why it is essential to gather as much information as possible to identify any cremains found and verify if they belong to veterans. Ask if a DD-214 is available or if there is military documentation that shows their release from service under conditions other than dishonorable.

If you find the remains of a forgotten veteran, have your post service officer contact the National Cemetery Scheduling Office at 1-800-535-1117 to verify the decedent is a Veteran and eligible for burial in a VA National Cemetery. Helping with this project is just one of the many ways we Sons support our veterans.


The city of Albion, Michigan, is fortunate to have not 1 but 2 sister cities in France. In 2023, dignitaries from Noisy-le-Roi and Bailly, France, came to Albion for a yearly cultural exchange between the sister cities. It is a week of celebration in Albion to show the best our city has to offer. At a banquet, the Mayor of Noisy-le-Roi gave a speech of how our towns all benefit from our relationship and what American involvement meant to the citizens of France during the World Wars—acknowledging that American

soldiers gave their lives for France, including some that may even have come from Albion.

The next morning, they attended a presentation at Post 55 by Historian (now Commander) Smith and member Dave Atchison on the American Legion's founding in Paris and its advocacy for retired service members. Historian Smith told the story of Patrick Leo Hanlon, the Post's namesake, who fought in France and gave his life for his fellow soldiers and the people of France during the Battle of the Juvigny Plateau on August 28, 1918. The presentation included how he was interned just 2 ½ hours away at the Oise Aisne American Cemetery. The delegates were moved by the presentation, saying that they had no idea how close our cities are because of one soldier. Later that year, the town of Noisy-le-Roi commemorated Corporal Hanlon during its Armistice Day celebration.

During the renovations of the Noisy-le-Roi city hall, a room was dedicated to Corporal Hanlon, and a permanent marker was placed in the cemetery. Ensuring that his sacrifice for the people of France will never be forgotten. In 2025, the city of Bailly, France, put a plaque in the cemetery to honor Patrick Leo Hanlon, ensuring that the people of the city will remember him.

We at American Legion Department of Michigan, Patrick Leo Hanlon Post 55, are honored and humbled to have this recognition of our namesake. We are not aware of another American soldier who has been so honored by the people of a foreign city or country.

IRS SAL Explained Brett Holt

Recently, the National Judge Advocate for the American Legion made a determination regarding Legion Members vs. SAL Members and their "Taxability" CLICK HERE FOR THAT OPINION. The SAL issue is an IRS issue. The Department of Michigan absolutely considers

the SAL as a part of the American Legion Family.

According to IRS law, a 501(c) (19) is a Veterans Organization with membership restricted to current and former members of the Armed Services and to Veterans Service Organizations Auxiliaries. Those Auxiliaries will have their own Congressional Charter, EIN and file their own 990 tax forms.

Here lies the issue. The SAL as a program of The American Legion, does not have a National Charter and is ineligible to have its own EIN. All SAL property and finances belong to The American Legion. When formed in 1932, the SAL was intended to be similar to the Boy Scouts, a youth program that taught young men with bloodline ties to veterans about patriotism and duty to God and Country. Today, the SAL has grown to be much more, but as a program, it does not qualify as a 501(c) (19) organization. Therefore, the IRS views them as ineligible for


non-taxable income under 501(c)19 rules.

The IRS is only interested in taxable income versus non-taxable income. "Members" sales fall under non-taxable income. Non-Members' sales are taxable income. "Guest" signed in by a member, and sales sold to the member for the guest are non-taxable income.

This doesn't affect Michigan Liquor Control Club license eligibility, and the SAL should still have a voice on the bar committee. Michigan Liquor Control considers any entity that has a voice on the club bar committee to be members.

According to IRS rules, there are two options available. Sign in all SAL as a guest, and all sales will remain non-taxable. OR, continue to sell to the SAL, but the post must record those sales separately and report them as taxable income. Which of these options you choose is up to your post. The Liquor license is issued to the post, and the taxable and non-taxable income, and how they are reported, are the sole responsibility of the post. Lastly, if your post has a class "C" license and not a club license, so it can always sell to the public, then <u>all sales</u> are taxable income.

Again, I strongly recommend reading the <u>National Judge</u> <u>Legal Opinion from November 6th, which includes the Rules of a Program</u>, which we have addressed in the past.

Program

The Dues Direct program frees your post officers from the renewal receipt and fulfillment process, which can be time-consuming. The membership records are usually updated much faster, which also reduces the number of renewal notices that need to be mailed. The processing cost is currently only \$0.83 per renewal, which includes the cost of postage. As you know, postage is already up to 76 cents per stamp. This is a no-brainer for a large post! In fact, over 5000 post-225 members' dues are processed in this manner.

Briefly, when renewal notices are mailed to your Post members, the return reply is sent directly to National Headquarters for processing. Members also have the option of renewing online through a special website. National processes the renewal payment, updates the membership record, and forwards the member their new membership card, which also includes our Department's contact information.
