New! Michigan American Legion Skilled Trades Scholarship

The American Legion Skilled Trades Scholarship aims to provide annual scholarships to deserving individuals – aged 17-21 years old – who are pursuing a construction/building, automotive, advanced manufacturing, or energy career either in a post-high school trades training/apprenticeship or earning a 2-year college degree in any of the areas listed above where the student would be certified at the state or federal level.

The scholarship would apply to the following costs:

- Money for tools, specialized clothing, gear, or safety equipment.
- Money for fees and expenses at a post-secondary skilled trades school training or apprenticeship.
- Money for fees and expenses at a 2-year college skilled trades program.
- Two (2) \$1,000 scholarships awarded at the discretion of the American Legion Department of Michigan's Education and Scholarship Committee in conjunction with scholarship donors.
- Scholarship checks will be issued to either the individual, school, training program, or business depending on if the funds will be applied to supplies or tuition. Proof of supply costs will be required for funds to be issued.
- The scholarship is valid for two years only, \$1,000 each year, with the disbursement of 2nd-year funds dependent on first-year transcripts and proof of enrollment in a 2nd-year trades program or college course or proof of continued employment.

Qualifications of the applicant:

- Must be a Michigan resident.
- Applicant should be between the ages of 17 and 21 at the time of application.
- Applicant must be pursuing a skilled trades career through post-high school trades training/apprenticeship OR a 2-year college degree in a skilled trade.
- It is preferred that the applicant be a descendant of a veteran but it is not required.

Applying for the scholarship:

- 1. Complete the application in its entirety.
- 2. Include High School or most current transcripts.
- 3. Include written recommendations from two persons: A teacher within the last two years and an employer or adult (non-relative) who can offer references for you.
- 4. Include proof of acceptance into trades training/ apprenticeship or acceptance into a 2-year college.

EAGLE SCOUT OF THE YEAR: UP TO \$10,000 SCHOLARSHIP!

American Legion, Department of Michigan Scouting program sponsors over 65 troops, packs, and crews in our American Legion posts. The Legion's support for Boy Scouts of America began at the Legion's first national convention in 1919. This is natural for Legionnaires, who bring their service-learned skills and experiences as veterans to help build character and positive traits in our country's youth. Few other post activities generate more goodwill from the community.

Eagle Scout of the Year: Applications Due March 1, 2024

The American Legion, Department of Michigan honors the Eagle Scout of the Year at the department convention. The winner of the competition receives a \$1,000 scholarship and is advanced to the national competition.

The American Legion annually honors the Eagle Scout of the Year at the national convention. The winner of the competition receives a \$10,000 scholarship, and the three runners-up are each awarded \$2,500 scholarships.

The American Legion knows some teachers teach about patriotism, Americanism, and the founding principles of the United States of America. We recognize that teachers spend their own money in the classroom and on their kids to make learning more enjoyable or easier to comprehend. Every year in The American Legion, the Department of Michigan recognizes five teachers working hard to impart those lessons to the children entrusted to them. We realize this is only a small gesture in the grand scheme of things, but we want to recognize them for their work. Posts are asked to work with their local schools to help locate a teacher who fits the criteria to be nominated for this award.

Boys State: A Civic Leadership Program

The American Legion Boys State program is a non-partisan, non-political mock government exercise. At Boys State, participants learn citizens' rights, privileges, and responsibilities. Its purpose is to awaken within the youth of our nation a sincere conviction that a well-informed, intelligent, and involved citizenry is vitally needed to protect and preserve our American traditions. The training is objective and modeled on the city, county, and state government structures.

Boys State grows out of the American Legion's faith in our young people and its firm belief that the future leaders of our country should have the tools necessary to keep it: a deep appreciation of active citizenship, an understanding of democracy, familiarity with our American form of government, and the discernment to select – and to be – productive leaders.

When: June 23-29, 2024

Where: Grand Valley State University- Allendale, MI

Eligibility: Male high school juniors going into their senior year in the fall of 2024

Application Deadline: May 1, 2024

Cost: \$25 Delegate Application Fee plus \$400 Sponsor Fee; total \$425

Sponsor: A sponsor can be an American Legion Post, Son of the American Legion Squadron, an American Legion Auxiliary Unit, but it can also be the boy's parents, a business owner, a school, or another organization like the Elks, Knights of Columbus, or a Moose club.

Scholarships: Samsung Scholarship: limited to students between their junior and senior years of high school who attend the current session of either an American Legion Boys State or American Legion Auxiliary Girls State program and are a direct descendant of a wartime U.S. military veteran who served on active duty during at least one of the periods of war officially designated as eligibility dates for American Legion membership. Up to \$10,000 scholarship awarded.

Student Trooper Program: \$500-\$1,000 Scholarships Available to Participants

Every year, high school students in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades are selected to participate in the Youth Law Cadet Law Enforcement Program. The program's purpose is to allow male and female students to explore and experience the various aspects of law enforcement training. Students participate in daily calisthenics and receive training in firearms, self-defense, fingerprinting, K-9 handling, accident and criminal investigation, and state patrol car driving. Students stay at the Michigan State Police Training Academy in Lansing.

Program Dates: June 23-28, 2024 Application Deadline: May 10, 2024

Cost: \$475 per student, usually sponsored by an American Legion Post/Squadron/Unit or other civic organization. Eligibility: Any boy or girl meeting the following standards who is going into 10th, 11th, or 12th grade in the Fall of 2023,

and is a Michigan resident, is eligible to be considered for selection into the Student Trooper Program:

- in good health and able to participate in physical activities;
- possess a positive attitude and display respect for law enforcement;
- average or above average academic record; 2.5 GPA and above; and
- possess a level 2 driver's license (preferred, not required)

- \$500 Academic Scholarship
- \$500 Marksmanship Scholarship
- \$500 Orator Scholarship
- \$1,000 Student Trooper of the Year Scholarship

AMERICAN LEGION SCHOOL AWARD MEDAL PROGRAM



The medals were first awarded in 1922 for boys in Pennsylvania, and in 1925 for girls. The initial categories, or points, that boys were judged on were courage, scholarship, service, honor, and leadership; girls were judged on courage, scholarship, service, character, and companionship.

The School Award program became an official Legion youth activity in 1927. Today, the points boys and girls are judged on are the same: courage, scholarship, service, honor, leadership, and patriotism. The current medal design, introduced in 1973, can be seen above.

BASIC PROGRAM OVERVIEW:

- 1) A committee appointed by a post commander should establish contact and build rapport with local schools.
- 2) Establish a series of talks with students and faculty to highlight the six qualities. Legionnaires should deliver these talks at the student's level of understanding.
- 3) Selection criteria and methods should be decided well in advance of actual elections. Voting should be by secret ballot of the students and faculty with the post committee making the final selection.
- 4) The entire school community should be aware of and understand the program. Suitable, local publicity should be arranged to accommodate this. The sole purpose of the program is to promote wholesome ideas in active citizenship among youth. No trace of politics, sectarianism, or favoritism should be attached to the program.
- 5) The medal presentation ceremony should take place in conjunction with a school's award or commencement ceremonies. A school-approved speaker from within The American Legion should speak on behalf of the award and lead that portion of the ceremony. Local veterans involved with the program should be enlisted to present the award.

OBJECTIVES

- I. Emphasizes the development of the six core qualities of active citizenship.
- II. Encourages the development of those ideals in young Americans to promote engaged citizenship.
- III. Offers recognition for those youth deemed most dedicated to the high qualities of citizenship and true Americanism.

QUALITIES FOR DEVELOPMENT

COURAGE: Bravery in the face of opposition and danger; determination and force to do right without public applause regardless of personal advantage. A quality of the intellect.

PATRIOTISM An ideal of loyal Americanism, religious tolerance, righteous freedom, and the willingness to defend the U.S. Constitution against all enemies—foreign and domestic. Perhaps best defined in the American's Creed.

HONOR: Highly developed moral character; moral excellence; strength and stability of character; high standards of conduct; devotion to duty; adherence to truth; a keen sense of what is right; the practice of healthy speech and thoughts.

SCHOLARSHIP: Attainments in school studies, quality of school work reflecting the fine traits of industry, perseverance, efficiency, and intelligence.

LEADERSHIP: Ability to lead and to accomplish through group action; ability to work in harmony and in unison with other leaders in accomplishing group results; desire and ability to fill the voids in the lives of others caused by timidity, illness, or other handicaps.

SERVICE: Kindness; unselfishness; fellowship; protection of the weak; promotion of the interests and the welfare of associates; and constructive aid for the promotion of education and community
