The History of Legion Baseball

What does Ted S. Williams, Yogi Berra and Reggie Jackson have in common? If you said baseball you are only half-correct. The answer is American Legion Baseball!

Since 1925, The American Legion has sponsored a nationwide youth baseball program. During these past eleven decades, millions of young players have enjoyed playing baseball. The American Legion and their 2.8 million members have raised millions of dollars each year for players to learn the importance of teamwork, discipline, leadership and good sportsmanship.

Did you know that more American Legion graduates have been inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame than any other amateur baseball program? The number of former Legion players who have gone on to the pros is far too large to chart. More than half of current major-leaguers played Legion Baseball. So did almost every working MLB manager, along with several former commissioners. In all, 85 American Legion Baseball graduates have been inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York.

WORLD SERIES


At the end of each season (mid-August), qualifiers from eight national regions compete in the American Legion World Series held in Shelby, North Carolina. The Legion pays for your travel, hotel, and food expenses, if your team qualifies for the tournament. Many of the games are even televised nationally on ESPN.

Did you know that over 83 National Baseball Hall of Famers played American Legion Baseball as teenagers? With an alumni base that includes more than half of current Major League Baseball players, American Legion Baseball is one of the most prominent and tradition-rich amateur athletic leagues in existence.

Robert Turner Baseball Scholarship

A \$500 Scholarship



The Turner Scholarship was created to honor the memory of Robert (Bob) Turner who was born in 1922 in Woodsfield, OH. As a child, his family moved in 1935 to Crystal, MI. Bob served in the United States Army Air Corps during World War II from October 1942 until his honorable discharge in March of 1946; reaching the rank of Sergeant. He was stationed on Seymour Island and received a Good Conduct Medal, Pacific Star and Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal. In the mid-1970s, his oldest son Bryce played Michigan American Legion Baseball. Bob supported the team by attending many of the games and was a life-long fan of baseball. The schol-

arship was established to help young Michigan Legion Baseball players achieve their dreams.

The Turner scholarship is available only to Michigan residents who have graduated from high school, are on a 2024 American Legion Baseball Team roster filed with the National Headquarters, and who are planning to attend any nationally accredited college or university. Selection is based on the application information, the student's GPA of 2.5 or higher, and two letters of testimony (one from the American Legion coach or team manager, and the other from a community leader, school official or minister). The scholarship award amount is \$500. The winner will be presented a plaque from the Turner family at the State Baseball Tournament.

How to Register Your Team Successfully

All American Legion Teams must register on the National American Legion Baseball website.

<u>Step 1 – Visit www.baseball.legion.org</u> to get the registration process started. You will need to sign into an existing account or create a new account if you are a new team. (Complete registration directions can be found on www.michiganlegion.org/baseball under Registration Tips)

<u>Step 2 – The Coach/Manager/Administer who will be completing the team application online</u> needs to successfully complete their background check. The Team application cannot be approved by the Michigan American Legion Baseball Secretary until all coaches listed on the application have passed a background check. If you need to add a coach to the team application after you have submitted it for approval you will need to call the Baseball Secretary at 517-220-2754 for assistance. (You will need to provide the coaches full name, address, email address and phone number to the Baseball Secretary in order for the coach to be added.) Those coaches will also be required to pass a background check prior to the FINAL Submission of the team roster with all its players and coaches.

The required background check for all coaches can be initiated at: https://opportunities.averity.com/ALDeptMichigan. Each team is required submit payment for the background checks (head coaches, team managers, and others) when they turn in their team packet to the District/Zone Baseball Chairman. Each background check costs \$23. (Ex: If you have 1 head coach, 1 manager, and 2 assistant coaches the cost would be \$92).

- <u>Step 3 Purchase the required Insurance and pay National and State Team Registration Fees prior to the deadline date of May 15, 2024 When you purchase the required insurance make sure to send a copy of your confirmation email from K&K Insurance to legion@michiganlegion.org, your team application will not show that you purchased insurance until you do this step.</u>
- <u>Step 4 Once</u> you have added all your coaching staff, purchased insurance, and paid team registration fees, you will need to submit your team application online. Once your application is approved you will be able to add players to your roster.
- Step 5 Add players and submit your roster on the National website prior to June 19, 2024. Once you submit your roster online you should print a copy to include with your team packet. Your team packet should contain a #2 form and license/Photo ID for each player, any #76 or #77 form as needed, Team Photo, payment for all background checks and new player fees (\$23 for each background check and \$10 for every new player), and a letter declaring which tier (AA, A) your team will be playing in. It is suggested that you make copies of the entire packet for your records. Team Packets will need to be turned into District/Zone representatives by June 19, 2024. All team packets are due from Zone Chairman on June 25, 2024 at 10 a.m.

Ten Tips on Starting a New American Legion Baseball Team


- 1. Do not wait until the last minute to begin the process. Contact your Zone Chairman (if known) or Department Headquarters to request a copy of National and State Baseball Rules. Read both sets of rules, paying special attention to the deadline dates. These deadline dates are important so be sure to make note of each one. Contact your Zone Chairman listed in the State Rule Book if you have questions. There are NO dumb questions.
- 2. In late Fall to early Winter contact your local post to present your plan for starting a Legion team. Do not expect much, if any, financial assistance the first year from the post. However, they may be willing to assist in a fundraiser to help with the costs. Player fee and fundraisers are the easiest way to meet your cost.
- **3.** Visit National's website, www.baseball.legion.org, to start the registration process. You should do this early because you will end up adding and/or deleting coach and player names several times prior to the submission deadline. Do NOT hit the submit button until your entire team is selected and entered on your roster. Once you hit the submit button you will be locked out, preventing any changes from being made.
- **4.** Anticipate spending a minimum of \$3,000 the first year: Approximately \$400 for insurance (K&K is the only approved vendor), \$125 fee to National (\$75-100 for National, and \$50 for State) plus a service fee of \$25. Also, there is a \$10 fee per new player (18 players max). As a new team all your players will be new so the cost would be \$180. There is an \$23 background check fee for each coach, manager, and volunteer you will have on staff. The remainder of the cost will be spent on uniforms and baseballs. Review National Rule 1, Section V for uniform requirements.
- **5.**Try to select your coaching staff as soon as possible. A background check is required for all coaches, manager, and volunteers (cost is \$23 each). You will be able to submit coaches' names on www.baseball.legion.org when you go through the registration process. The new player fee and background check fee is paid when you submit your Team Roster packet to District/Zone Chairman in June.
- 6. Each team must declare a base school (National Rule 4). Make that determination early in the process.
- 7. You will need a #2 Form for each player (2 pages). The best way to get the forms completed is to have a player/parent meeting late April to early May. Then if you add a player late, all you need to do is work with that individual player and parent.
- **8.** Determine if you are going to declare Class AA or Class A status (National Rule 4 Class AA, and State Rule 32 for Class A). Consult with your Zone Chair if you have questions.
- **9.** Make sure you list all your players on the National website (#2 Form). If a player is not listed on the roster, they will be ineligible for post season play and any potential insurance claim.
- 10. You will be required to submit a paper copy of your roster with all the necessary forms attached to your District or Zone Chair. This is referred to as a Team Roster Packet. It should include a #2 Form for each player with a copy of their driver's license or Michigan Identification card, a #76 or #77 form (as needed), a team photo, and a check for the new player and background check fees. Make sure you keep a copy of everything you submit to the District/Zone Chairman.

2024 Timeline for Registering Your Team

- ☑ <u>January 1st-May 15th</u> Go to baseball.legion.org and register your team. Once your team is approved (after the background checks are completed) use the username and password you created to sign back in and purchase your insurance as well as State (\$50) & National (\$75-\$100) fees online. FYI: insurance must be purchased before tryouts. So, the earlier you set tryouts the earlier you need to purchase your insurance.
- ☑ May 15th 4:00 PM EST Insurance Deadline. Newly formed teams that miss
 the established deadline shall have until June 1 to purchase insurance without
 penalty. Should a previously registered team miss the established deadline, then
 they shall have "grace" period until June 1st at 4:00 PM EST to purchase insurance, but assessed a late fee of \$200.
- June 19th ALL teams must have submitted their roster online and handed to the district (if no district then zone) chairman all necessary forms (#2, #76, #77) along with the \$10 per new player fee, \$23 per background check fee, team photo, written declaration stating which tier (A, AA) for their review. EVERY player on your roster need a #2 form COMPLETELY filled out along with #76 or #77 as necessary. Teams should make copies of all forms for their own records.
- ☑ June 22 -ALL district chairmen must hand copies of all forms to their zone chairman. The zone chairman will then certify teams as eligible or ineligible. District Chairman, it is in your best interest to make copies of any or all forms that you may need to refer to in a District Tournament for your own files
- ☑ June 25 at 10:00 AM- All Zone chairmen must hand copies of all forms to the State Chairman for the Department files. Zone Chairman, it is in your best interest to make copies of any or all forms that you may need to refer to in a Zone Tournament for your own files. Consequences for not having ALL proper paperwork to the State Chairman by June 25 at 10:00 a.m. is ineligibility.


